“Digging In”

Michael and I recently planted a flower garden. Filled with roses, white-flowering shrubs, shade perennials and a bubbling fountain, it graces the front of our home and adds a cheery welcome to visitors. For both of us, this was the longest we had gone living in a place -- this May marks our third growing season here -- without jumping trowel-first into the landscape and satiating our horticultural appetites. Previous gardens had been started early and in earnest: our previous home in Lake Wylie, SC was fully landscaped within two months of living there; our separate homes before that had been faithfully cultivated. So why the delay? What kept us from immediately rolling up our sleeves and digging in?

The postponement may have been due to the fact that we both lead extraordinarily busy lives, or perhaps because our house was enveloped by mature but languishing shrubs and trees that had been planted too closely together. Not dealing with the required herbicide or displacing resident wood nymphs had become the path of least resistance. But I think there was more to it than that. We had both recently lived in several homes over a short period of time, and it was exhausting to think about committing the time and energy required to plant yet another landscape that we might not be able to watch mature.

But dig we did, and what a difference our small investment of time and resources has made! The new roses have added a welcome splash of color to the front yard and the shadier perennials tantalize us both with their insistent growth and irrepressible production of flower buds. I find myself eagerly anticipating my walk through the new landscape at the end of the day, and I've enjoyed falling asleep to the delightful sounds of the fountain, just steps from our bedroom window.

For us, “digging in” has really made all the difference. By committing our selves to this project, we became more deeply connected to our home and community – in the process of spending time in our yard, we met more neighbors in one week than we had in two years. We also feel better about spending time in our yard and inviting friends over.

It excites me to think about other areas of my life that can benefit from such a personal commitment: my spiritual growth, my personal relationships, my church and larger community. I'm reminded that the opportunity to change our circumstances and to more deeply engage in our world

is always before us. “Digging in” can make all the difference.

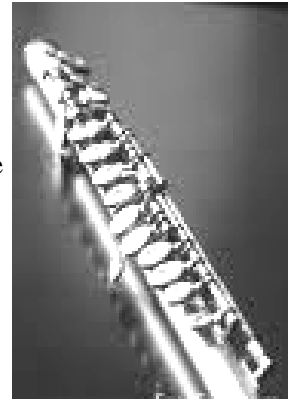
MUSIC NEWS

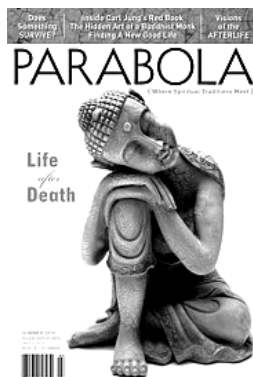
Mountain Retreat
