## FROM THE MINISTER

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While attending the Thoreau Society's annual gathering in Concord, Massachusetts, I began Friday, July 9 on an early morning walking tour with two authors who were pointing out sites significant to radical abolitionist John Brown in his time in Concord. Along the way though those streets I struck up a conversation with a West Point professor who has recently completed his own book on Brown. He was also just back from a six-month stint teaching at the Military College in Afghanistan where he presented all of the local faculty with copies of Thoreau's *Walden*. Our discussion ranged from Brown to Thoreau to terrorism to slavery to race as we reflected on the ways several in the mid-nineteenth century town of Concord responded so enthusiastically to John Brown's impassioned efforts.

Back at the Masonic Temple where most of the events were held (and where Thoreau had taught school as a young recent Harvard graduate) I spent the rest of the morning listening to an engaging panel discussion that included Laura Dassow Walls, one of the world's premier scholars of Thoreau and American Transcendentalism.

At lunch I ate with Barry Andrews, Unitarian minister and author of books on Emerson, Margaret Fuller and Thoreau. We ended up talking with a South Korean professor who teaches Emerson and Thoreau in his native land. Our discussion turned to the relationship between Emerson and Confucianism.

That afternoon I heard a presentation on the phenomena of utopian communities from a woman who has recently published on this topic. Then, two scholars reflected on the aspects of Transcendentalism found in Thoreau's *A Week on the Concord and Merrimack Rivers*.

The day ended at an exhibit at the Concord Free Public Library followed by late night conversation with fellow attendees including John Matteson whose Pulitzer Prize-winning dual biography of Bronson and Louisa May Alcott, *Eden's Outcasts*, is one of the best books I have read recently.

This one day snapshot gives you a glimpse into the beginning weeks of my sabbatical. One of my major goals for this time is to have the opportunity to reflect more deeply on the lives and writings of the American Transcendentalists. I could not have had a more stimulating way to jumpstart that reflection than I have enjoyed by being in Concord. To be able to hear and engage with scholars in that

setting, to be able to visit homes and other sites important to Alcott, Emerson, Fuller, Thoreau and others, and to have access to the remarkable resources of the Concord Free Public Library made for a profoundly enriching time.

I remain so very grateful for this opportunity. It frankly still feels more than a little surreal to me as I engage an entirely different rhythm to my days. I have a markedly deepened understanding already of the ways a sabbatical can prove engaging and expect that awareness will only deepen in the coming weeks and months.

You remain close in my thoughts in this time away. My ongoing thanks to all who have worked so hard to make this possible, especially

the Sabbatical Planning Team and those leading so ably each Sunday. I'm also deeply appreciative of the ongoing hard work by our very fine professional staff. My very best wishes to all from afar.

### August 27 (Faith) – *In America* (2002)

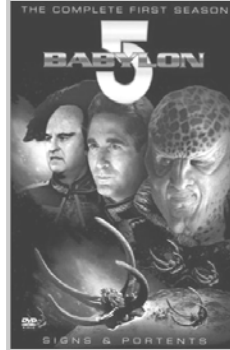

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## 2010-11 Children and Youth Religious Education Program (CYRE) Registration

Registration forms were emailed in early August to all families registered in the 09-10 CYRE program and to new families as requested. If you are new and would like to receive registration information, please contact Kathleen Carpenter. Forms are posted on the UCC website ([www.uuccharlotte.org](http://www.uuccharlotte.org)), as well. Visitors are welcome to attend classes up to three times before registering. Children and youth must be registered to participate in any special programming or off-site activities.

Families do not have to be UCC members to enroll their children in the CYRE program. We welcome everyone! However, it should be noted that our program is not secular; it is designed to help our children develop an identity as a Unitarian Universalist. While the curriculum used is very appropriate and welcoming to non-UUs, the rituals and curricula used are specific to Unitarian Universalism and to our congregation.

The prospectus referenced above provides specific details on what we offer. The 2010--11 prospectus for the Children and Youth Religious Education Program is now ready and can be found on the UCC website ([www.uuccharlotte.org](http://www.uuccharlotte.org)) or can be picked up on the table as you enter the Education wing.

## Parent Orientations – Plan to attend

Parents are the primary religious educators for their children and we can't accomplish much without them. We have your children at most 1.25 hours each week. Children look to their parents to learn about life, including their spiritual and moral development. As such, we strongly encourage parents to do two things:

- Deepen their own spiritual faith and their understanding of Unitarian Universalism by taking advantage of opportunities offered for adults in our congregation. Attend a class or one hour presentation, join an affinity group, attend Sunday services, or participate in social justice activities... No time? Kathleen Carpenter, the CYRE Director can recommend books or blogs. By all means, parents should share their beliefs with their kids. Which means they need to think about them first.
- Support their children's CYRE experience through their own involvement in the CYRE program and family programming. To find out how to do this, plan to attend one of our 3 age-specific parent orientations: Preschool – 5<sup>th</sup> Grade: *Sunday, September 19 1:30pm*; 6<sup>th</sup>-8<sup>th</sup> Grades: *Sunday, September 12, 1:30pm*; 9<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> Grades: *Sunday, September 19, 7pm*.

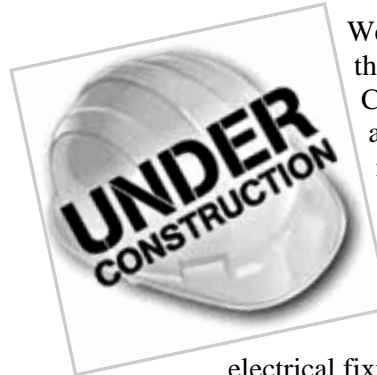
#### Brian and Del Jewell (Alex, David)

## BUILDING CONSTRUCTION UNDERWAY



We have begun work surrounding the replacing of the roofs over the CYRE/ODS wing, the Sanctuary and the vestibule. So far, painting has been done in Freeman Hall and the vestibule along with plaster repair of the ceiling in the Sanctuary and the vestibule. All of the ceiling tiles and insulation and the

electrical fixtures on the second floor of the CYRE/ODS wing have been removed. Work on the roofs in these areas will begin the week of August 16<sup>th</sup>.

Replacing the roofs also means that other work must take place as well. Early in the planning of the needed work, a choice was made to also undertake freshening some of the most important public areas. A "Tone Team" consisting of Loyd Dillon, Janet Lasher and Mitchell Kearny is overseeing color selection and other interior design.

All of us are extremely grateful for the leadership of Don Faires. Don is once again contributing his years of experience in construction management and is serving as the general contractor for the numerous jobs taking place. Don and Rob Marcy, chair of the finance team, are currently meeting weekly with Jeter Walker to make sure that our projects come in on budget and on time.

Also in August, the ODS beautification day will take place on the 21<sup>st</sup> (*see beautification article on this page.*) An additional work day for the church may be scheduled as well so that everything will be ready to go by the time we have our water ceremony on August 29. If you have suggestions about other things that need to be done and which could be accomplished using volunteer help please let us know.

In the meantime, the work that's going on looks good and is giving a fresh, new look to some of our most used spaces. While we have limits on what can be done with available resources, careful management and good subcontractors are delivering even more impact for our investment than we expected. We hope you'll be impressed, too.
